The Service Project Committee is proud to announce Maydm as its non-profit organization for the 2019-2020 year. Maydm provides girls and youth of color in grades 6-12 with skill-based training for the technology sector.

Winnie Karanja, Maydm's executive director, founded the program in 2016. Winnie describes Maydm best: "Our programs equip girls and students of color with the skills, knowledge and confidence they need to pursue a future in the tech field, improving their quality of life and revolutionizing the tech industry. Maydm has been the first in-depth STEM adventure for the majority of the students we've worked with, and we want to make it as accessible as possible." 
Maydm Inc.

Maydm is a 501(c)(3) non profit that provides girls and youth of color in grades 6-12 with skill-based training for the technology sector. Maydm's holistic approach includes mentorship and industry exposure to prepare students from traditionally underrepresented populations to engage in and revolutionize the tech industry. Maydm teaches programs in a variety of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) topics including how to build websites and Android Apps



Founder and Executive Director of Maydm, Winnie Karanja, holds a Master of Science in Development Studies and A Bachelor of Arts in Education and International Politics. She has worked on national data projects, has led economic development initiatives, and is committed to equipping youth in utilizing and understanding the power of technology to fuel their dreams. She began Maydm because she knows girls and students of color are extraordinary, and she wanted to create a space in tech where they can flourish.

In 2018, the state of Wisconsin had only 918 computer science graduates to fill 6,939 open computing jobs. Only 35% of schools nationally teach Computer Science programming, and only 17% of Wisconsin high schools offered AP Computer Science. While the median African-American salary in Wisconsin is \$30,721, the average computer or math occupation salary is \$74,520.



Contrary to these statistics though, Maydm works with 62% girls, 81% students of color, and 79% students who receive free or reduced lunch. Maydm envisions a world where all students know that a career in STEM is possible for them; a world where all students are equipped with the skills to elevate their quality of life; a world where all students can pursue their dreams as entrepreneurs, developers, engineers, or professors.

Thank you for your support in selecting Maydm as the recipient of your fundraising this year. We are so grateful for your generosity and commitment to the community.

Recycle for Mindset, Inc. The Service Project Committee will continue collecting used ink cartridges at every luncheon for Mindset, Inc. Mindset is a non-profit organization dedicated to building healthier minds and more fulfilled lives. They offer free mental wellness education, tools, and resources to all Dane County residents. One source of their funding comes from recycling old ink cartridges. They will accept any brand and size of empty inkjet or toner cartridges. We ask that you put them in a plastic bag to prevent leakage.
